Ruling puts mayor's race back on Pine Lake ballot

For the third time this term, the citizens of **Pine Lake** will attempt to elect a mayor.

The City Council has decided to hold a second special election for the position after Judge Marvin Sorrells, ruling for the DeKalb County Superior Court, this month set aside a June 28 special election to replace resigned Mayor Neil Copeland.

The election - won by Michael Stuckey by a slim two-vote margin -was challenged last year by opponent Tommie Storms. Sorrells agreed with Storms' argument that confusion concerning the wording **on** the election ballots could have been responsible for three that were filled out or deposited improperly and disqualified. Had the ballots gone Storms' way, she would have garnered a one-vote victory.

Stuckey, mayor for the last six months, maintains that it was voter error, not confusing **ballot** instructions, that led to the ballots being disqualified.

"That's the position of the city and that is my opinion, as well," Stuckey said.

Residents will decide March 21 who will complete the term, which ends next January.

New president at DeKalb Historical: Charlotte Rowell is the new president of the DeKalb Historical Society. Past president of the DeKalb Junior League, she was a leader in the campaign to acquire the Callanwolde mansion for use as a public arts center. Rowell was reared in the East **Lake** area and later was a teacher at schools in East **Lake** and Kirkwood.

Other new officers include: Jimmy Dickey III, vice president of finance; Donna Mancini, vice president of programs; Mari Jo Ford, vice president of resources; Bill Daniel, treasurer; and Joy Manbeck, secretary.
